WHAT IS VOCATIONAL TRAINING / EDUCATION?

Vocational = "related to a **career**"

- Training is directly related to the job or skill required to do the job
- Training is typically under 1 year in length
- Job-ready upon completion

EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION PROGRAM – DUAL CREDIT PROGRAM

- Who? **Grade 12 students**
- When/Where: Semester 1: **English 12 plus one elective at WGSS. University of the Fraser Valley's ECE 100 and ECE 101 during UFV's fall semester (September to December). One of these courses will be at UFV and the other at Yale Secondary or Langley School Board Office.**
- Semester 2: **Capstone/CLC and Work and volunteer experience at WGSS. ECE 102 and Communications 125 during UFV's winter semester (January to April) One course at UFV and the other at Yale Secondary or Langley School Board Office.**
- Runs from September to April, 5:00pm - 8:00pm, twice per week
- Earn 12 high school credits towards the Early Childhood Education Certificate.
- To Apply: **See Ms. Puneet Pawar, Career Advisor** to complete an application.
- Pre-requisites: completed English 11, be a grade 12 student, recommended C+ or higher in English 10 and Math 10, intention to graduate with a Dogwood Diploma.
- Fees: About \$300.00 for textbooks
- UFV tuition is paid by the Langley School District...approx. \$2,200.00. Bursaries are available.

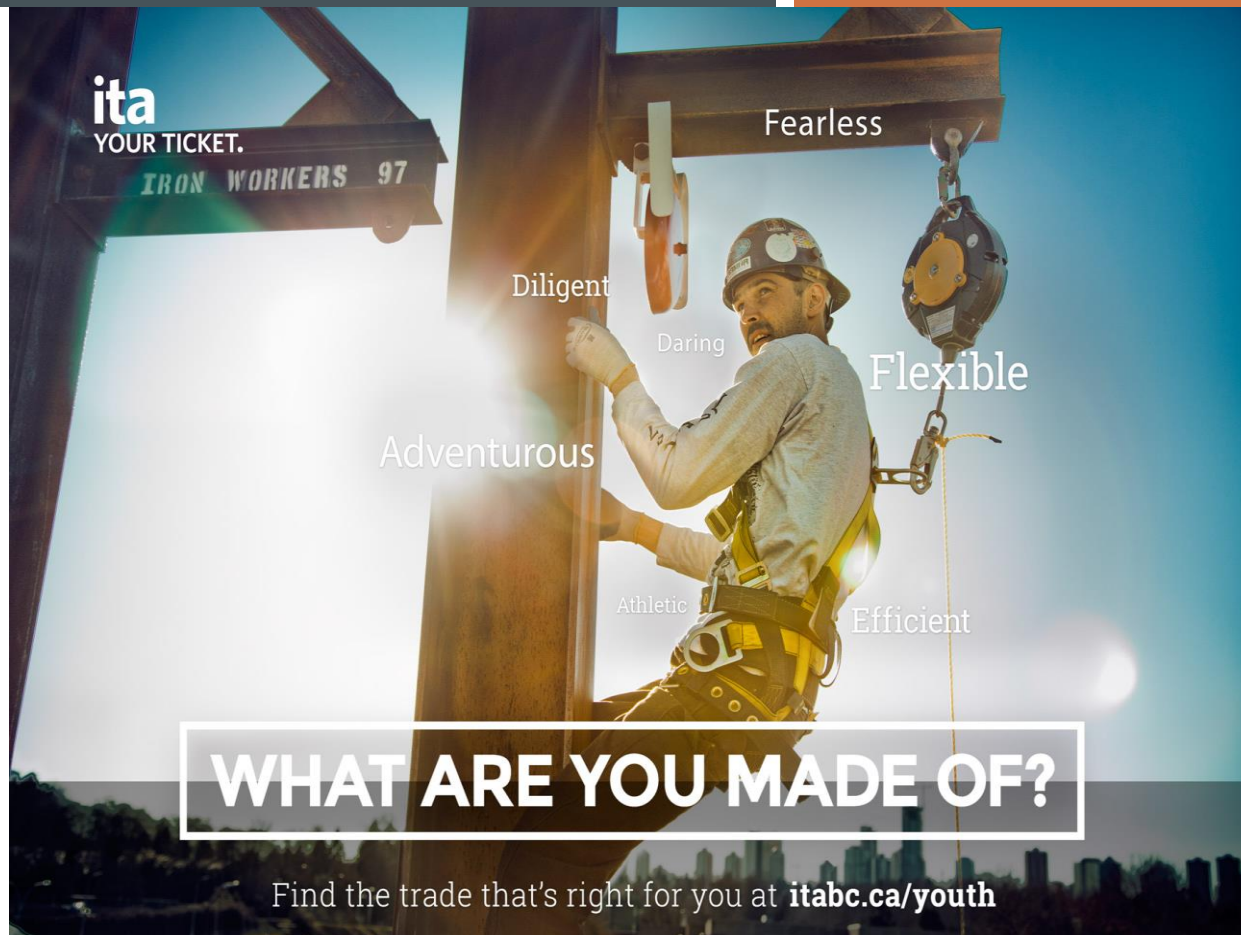

LANGUAGE ARTS: English 11 + 12 recommended;

MATH: Apprenticeship and Workplace 11 is fine for some programs but not for trades such as **Electrician** which requires Academic Math 11 and Physics 11 or Chemistry 11, Foundations 11 or Pre-Calculus 11

Pre-Calculus is okay for all programs

Note: Specific Program Entry Requirements must be researched to determine the recommended high school pre-requisite courses.

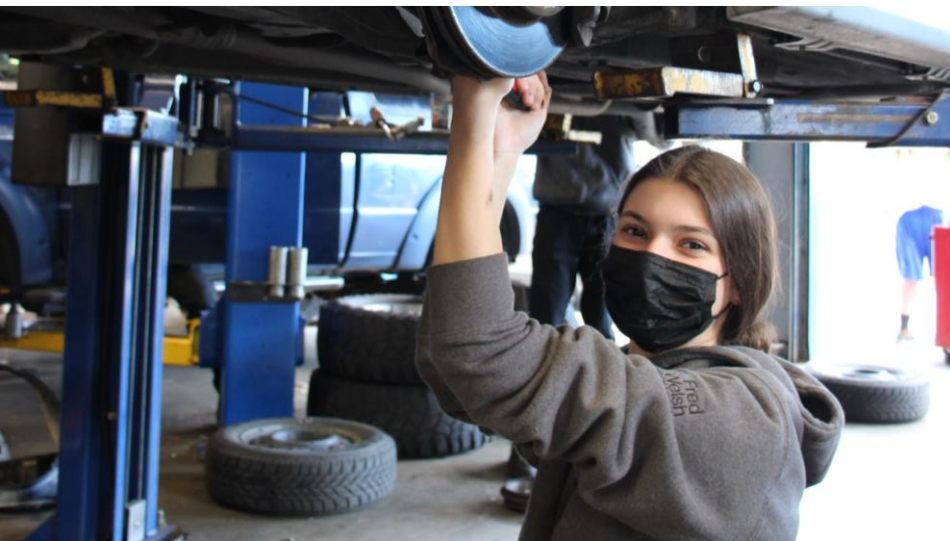

TRAIN IN TRADES STUDENTS

HOW DO I GET INTO ONE OF THESE PROGRAMS?

Applications are required - students need to fill out an application package
(Due March 30th 2024)

Selected applicants will be interviewed
(April-May)

Prerequisite courses are different for each program

No tuition! (students only pay program fees for books/materials)

Program schedules (depending on program):

- February-January
- September-June

Ask your Career Advisor how to apply!

DUAL CREDIT PROGRAMS: EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATOR (ECE)

- Early Childhood Educator Dual Credit Program in partnership with Abbotsford School District and the University of the Fraser Valley
- Launched in September 2022
- Students will earn 12 credits towards ECE Childhood Certificate while also earning high school credits
- Will make them immediately employable as an ECE Assistant



HEALTH SCIENCE (ACADEMIC DUAL CREDIT)

- Partnering with KPU
- Applications likely due in April (TBD)
- Post-secondary credits for HSCI 1115 (3 credits) & 4 high school credits

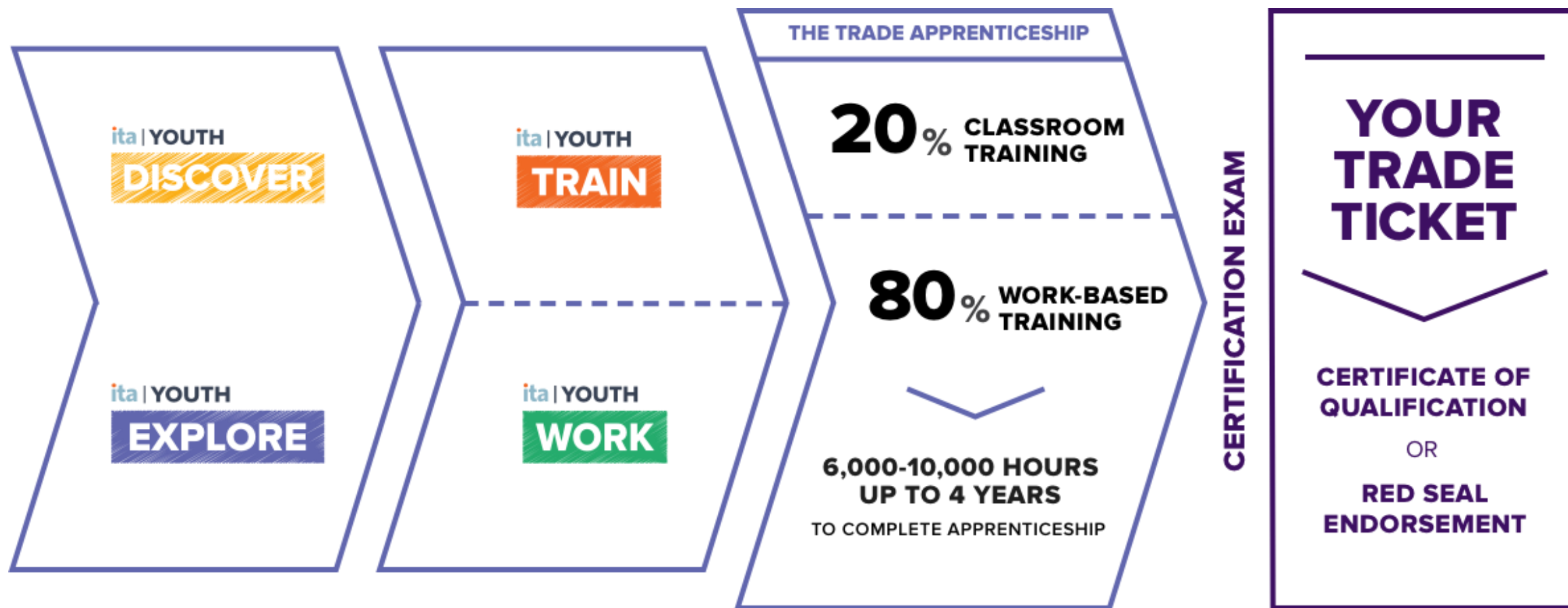
YOUTH WORK IN TRADES

Allows students to start their apprenticeship while they are still in high school. They can earn graduation credits while logging work-based training hours that count towards their apprenticeship. Students can register at any time during the school year.

Benefits:

- Earn 16 elective credits towards graduation (equals 4 courses)
- Acquire skills employers want
- Get a head start on your career
- Use 480 paid work hours towards your apprenticeship
- Have a seamless transition from school to work
- Eligible for a \$1000 award

WAVE - WORK AND VOLUNTEER EXPERIENCE

Try WAVE?



A high school course that students normally complete outside of school hours at an employer's place of business

Students are placed with employers/organizations to job shadow and/or perform the duties of an entry level employee

Students gain experience and new skills in the workplace they wouldn't be able get at school

Students use the skills they have learned in school and apply them at the workplace

WHY WAVE?

- Earn up to eight elective credits towards graduation (equals two courses)
- Get paid or gain volunteer experience while earning school graduation credits
- Gain experience in almost any industry/occupation
- Have a placement with a new employer or continue where you are already working/volunteering
- Acquire skills and experience employers want
- Get a head start on your career
- Have a smoother transition from school to work
- Potential to be offered paid employment with employers
- Take more than nine courses in a school year, does not impact current school schedule
- Find your own employer or connect with the assistance of a teacher

WAVE REQUIREMENTS

- Be in grade 10-12
- Have parent/guardian permission
- Follow expectations from SD35, your school and your employer
- Work/volunteer up to 170 hours with an employer
- Arrange your own transportation to/from the employer
- Complete school requirements in order to participate in a placement

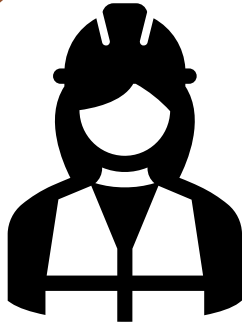

Becoming an RCMP Officer

The Career

RCMP Officers keep Canadians safe by ensuring public safety and security, investigating crime and enforcing the law. The work involves shift work, relocation possibly across Canada, carry a weapon, use of force, exposure to trauma, violence and disturbing events. New Constables make an annual salary of \$50, 674. The annual salary is approximately \$85, 113. RCMP officers also receive a pension and medical and dental benefits. New recruits start their career in general duty policing at the detachment level. This role provides Officers with an opportunity to experience a broad range of meaningful and challenging assignments, and gives them a solid foundation for any specialization they may choose to pursue later on.

If you intend to become an RCMP officer, you must meet their application requirements. You must plan to spend approximately six months at the RCMP Academy, Depot Division in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan followed by approximately 18 months in the field. You must be accepted as a Cadet recruit and complete the training program.

If you intend to become an RCMP officer, you must meet their application requirements and plan to spend approximately six months at the RCMP Academy (Depot) in Regina, Saskatchewan followed by approximately 6 months of Recruit Field Training (RFT). Once accepted as a Cadet with the RCMP, you will start your training at Depot, the RCMP Training Academy in Regina, Saskatchewan. Here you will be assigned to a troop of 32 Cadets, and begin a 24-week Cadet Training Program (CTP). Cadet training is offered in both official languages, English and French. A typical day lasts from 6 a.m. until 4:30 p.m., and there are also program related duties after hours. Being an RCMP Officer demands a high level of self-discipline and control. To help recruits acquire this skill, a paramilitary environment exists. The RCMP is seeking highly motivated team players who possess strong self-discipline and a wide range of backgrounds. All applicants are expected to possess strong self-discipline and integrity. Honesty, Professionalism, and Integrity are essential qualities for an RCMP Officer.

Application requirements:

- Be a Canadian citizen
- Be 19 years of age or older
- Be a resident of Ontario

Application requirements:

- Be a Canadian citizen
- Be 19 years of age at the time of engagement
- Be proficient in English and/or French
- Possess a valid, unrestricted driver's license
- Possess a Canadian secondary school (high school) diploma or equivalent
- Meet the health and psychological standards
- Meet the vision standards
- Meet the hearing standards
- Have access to a dentist

- Be prepared to carry a firearm and to use it or any other necessary physical force
- Be willing to spend six (6) months at the RCMP Academy (Depot) in Regina, Saskatchewan
- Be willing to relocate anywhere within Canada
